MELWOOD PROJECT APPROVED BY COUNTY BOARD

On February 22 the County Board approved a 5 story, 60' apartment building, with 105 affordable apartments on the site of the old Nellie Custis School on 23rd Street. At the hearing, there was a lot of support for the building from many affordable housing supporters from outside the neighborhood; our neighbor civic association Aurora Highlands was almost 100% opposed to the large building and the implications for future development on 23rd Street, claiming it is out of scale in the residential neighborhood and its lack of adequate parking, quoting Arlington's Comprehensive Plan that protects low residential neighborhoods. **Arlingtonians for Our Sustainable Future**, who were opposed to the "high density mixed use apartment building in a low-density area", released comments on the decision, and its implication for the future of the Arlington Comprehensive Plan, a guide to growth and development in the County. HISTORICAL MARKER FOR QUEEN CITY

Construction of the Pentagon in the 1940 was responsible for the mass displacement of an African American neighborhood, Queen City, and now a historical marker will be erected with the history of the community. The Black Heritage Museum of Arlington joined with Arlington's historic preservation staff to decide the wording of the marker, saying "People need to know what happened". Queen City in the late 1930s had 900 residents on the eastern end of Columbia Pike, and when the nation was preparing for war in the early 1940s, Roosevelt selected the site for the Pentagon. Residents were removed using eminent-domain and offered limited compensation. Most moved to other segregated neighborhoods in the County, DC and elsewhere. After the war, Arlington officials thought about building replacement housing, but were persuaded that the idea was "revolutionary, communistic or socialistic", and so did nothing. Now at least we will have a marker.

Possible changes in Arlington rules on lot coverage could affect how large areas of the county could be developed and make existing homes out of step with zoning regulations. On Feb. 25 the County Board directed staff to study if it makes sense to change how permeable surfaces are calculated: currently some barriers to water seeping into the ground rather than running off are not counted. Also, it is now easier with photo-imaging systems to calculate with relative accuracy the entire permeable surface

of any lot. The initiative is an effort to better align zoning regulations with environmental concerns. The issue will be revisited in May with an update.
