JBGSMITH & COUNTY BOARD MEMBERS TO JOIN US FOR MARCH MEETING

JBGSmith owns by far the most commercial real estate in 22202, the bulk of it in **Crystal City** but also the land on which Amazon is planning to build its corporate campus in Pentagon City. Andrew VanHorn, JBG's Executive VP for Development, will be on hand to share with us his company's ambitious vision for rejuvenating Crystal City in the coming years along with specific construction projects they are about to launch.

Thereafter, County Board Members Libby Garvey and Matt de Ferranti will join us to explain the County's role in landing **Amazon's HQ2**, including its recently concluded financial arrangement with Amazon, together with the revenue the County expects to derive over time as a consequence of the Company's presence in Arlington. We also hope to be briefed on a number of community concerns involving not just traffic, schools and housing costs which will likely be impacted by Amazon's arrival. This will be our opportunity to ask the many questions that have been festering in so many of our minds and to learn how the County is planning to deal with the many challenges accompanying the arrival of our new corporate neighbor. COUNTY WEBSITE ON TRANSPORTATION & PLANNING IN 22202

The County website now has a large collection of 22202 transportation data assembled in response to ARCA's 2015 request for an independent think-tank study of its infrastructure's capacity to accommodate future development. Based on its interpretation of this pre-2016 historic data, County staff contend that congestion has abated in recent years and there is no need for any such study given the improved transportation networks. The comprehensive base-line data include historic traffic counts, ART, Metrobus and Metrorail ridership, and demographics which ARCA hopes a sophisticated urban transportation think tank could use with computer modeling to analyze and project whether and how our traffic infrastructure could be restructured in the coming decades to avoid undue congestion in light of planned construction in Crystal City as well as the 4 million square foot campus Amazon plans to build in Pentagon City to accommodate its 25,000 employees.

ARTS BUDGET SLASHED

The County Manager is proposing that the budget for Arlington's Cultural Affairs' award winning programs be slashed by a stunning \$500,000. Winner of the Ford Foundation and Kennedy School of Government Innovations in Government award, which honors programs that do a lot with little money, Arlington's arts programs have been held up as a model around the world. The Manager proposes to close the Costume Lab and Scene Studio program located at Gunston, which provide services to many local arts groups. In addition two staff members will be laid off. Matching grant funds to local arts groups will also be cut, along with support for county wide special events. Janet Kopenhaver of the advocacy group Embracing Arts says, "the tiny arts program is being held accountable for a share of this year's budget shortfall that is 62.5 times greater than its share of the county budget." As Hippocrates said, "Ars longa vita brevis" (art is long, life is short).

APS is currently developing its 2020 fiscal year budget, an especially challenging one as APS works to address a shortfall of \$43 million. The superintendent's first draft of the budget makes it likely that there will be increased class sizes and staff layoffs as part of the proposed cuts. It also expects an increase in enrollment of about 1,000 students next year. Feel free to weigh in with your thoughts.

ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS ZONING CHANGES: Construction to be Encouraged

County staff is circulating a draft policy recommending property owners be allowed to build new, free-standing ADUs with only a 5' setback from street and property lines. The County views these units as a low-cost way to beef up affordable housing options in Arlington. Previous regulations did not allow new buildings; now they are being encouraged. "A five foot setback would allow some space between property lines and ADUs, and create enough room for direct sunlight to flow into all buildings on the property," advocates say. ARLINGTON ONCE AGAIN RANKED “BEST CITY TO LIVE IN AMERICA”

The online review service Niche has once again awarded Arlington top marks in part due to its high quality public schools, low crime rate, abundant nightlife and walkability. They have also ranked the school system as the top option in the state, and among the best suburbs in the country!

HOWEVER...ARLINGTON IS ALSO POLITICALLY INTOLERANT!

The Atlantic magazine has named Arlington among the country's least politically open-minded counties, ranking them based on how much “partisan prejudice” citizens expressed. The ranks were based on surveys in which questions such as how they felt about family members marrying across the political aisle, and whether Democrats or Republicans were “selfish, compassionate or patriotic”. Voter turnout and registration was factored in, and Arlington ended up ranked in the 100th percentile of the most prejudiced. Across the country, Suffolk Co. Mass. was ranked the most politically close-minded, and Watertown, NY the most open minded.
