PENTAGON CITY PLANNING STUDY

ARCA Board's Comments after the October 27 Special Members Meeting

ARCA continues to engage with Arlington County on the Pentagon City Planning Study, which aims to build the vision and plan for the future of Pentagon City. The ARCA Board conducted a special members meeting on October 27th, soliciting verbal and written inputs from members, which were used to convey feedback to the County Planning Staff in person (virtually) and in writing.

The ARCA Board's feedback included the opinion that developments like RiverHouse would serve the community better as medium density transition areas, a compromise between the existing plan and the zero up-zoning described in the 2013 Arlington Ridge Neighborhood Conservation Plan. We expressed approval of greener and walkable elements, a new elementary school, and improved transit/walkability to a vibrant Pentagon and Crystal City— but also the belief that benefits should not come at the expense of public services and facilities, diversion of traffic through neighborhoods, congestion, and security concerns. We suggested the plan include clear performance metrics and risk mitigation plans to address the heightened demand for public and private transit and other public facilities and infrastructure. We also requested the plan clearly define community benefits/infrastructure to support the needs of 22202, to include schools, a community center/library, parks, public and private transportation improvements, and access to medical facilities.

ICE SKATING RETURNS TO PENTAGON ROW

The Pentagon Row Ice Rink has opened for the season --changes from last year include higher capacity, a dollar increase in admission fees, and masks are now optional. The 7,000 sq.ft. rink remains the "largest outdoor rink in Northern Virginia," according to its website.

APS TO REDRAW BOUNDARIES FOR GUNSTON AND WAKEFIELD

Arlington Public Schools (APS) will be redrawing the boundaries of six schools to relieve overcapacity problems at Abingdon Elementary School, Gunston Middle School and Wakefield High School. It focused on schools where enrollment has exceeded capacity for the last 2 years, and where a nearby school can accommodate additional students. Gunston students will go to Jefferson and Wakefield's to Washington-Liberty (W-L) where 600 additional seats will open in January, 2022. Policy considerations, APS says, were efficiency, proximity, stability, alignment, demographics and contiguity. Full details of the boundary change are at apsva.us/engage/fall-2021-boundary-process/

SCHOOLS ENROLLMENT DOWN 4% , SUBSTITUTES NEEDED!

New figures show that Arlington has fewer students than it did pre-pandemic, based on enrollment figures on September 30. The superintendent, Francisco Duran, says the drop compares favorably to Fairfax, which reported a 5% decline.

APS is also recruiting new classroom substitutes, and has increased the daily stipend for them to the highest in Northern Virginia. Contact subs@apsva.us

ARLINGTON COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL FOR PENPLACE

Arlington County and Arlington Public Schools announced that Amazon will support the building of a permanent home for the Arlington Community High School as part of its PenPlace development in Pentagon City. It will be built as part of the mixed-

use development at S.Fern and Army Navy Drive. The 20,000 sq.ft. space will serve approx. 300 students aged 16 and older from across the County, who are focused on earning a high school diploma while preparing for college, work and the future, with many working full or part time. Currently the school is co-located with the Career Center, which is itself undergoing renovation.

AMAZON BUILDS "AWS Think Big Space" AT WAKEFIELD HS

Amazon is building a tech and innovation education lab at Wakefield High School, where students, teachers and the community will have access to hands-on STEM and robotics learning as well as Amazon-proprietary and cloud computing technologies. It should be ready to launch by the end of 2021 and will be open to students in grades 9 – 12 from across the school system. Brian Huseman, Amazon's vice president for public policy says "We are committed to making a positive impact in the communities where our employees live and work, to provide the tools for students to build, imagine and innovate their best future."

LOST ARLINGTON COUNTY**By Charlie Clark**

Arlington journalist and historian, Charlie Clark, has just published "Lost Arlington County", a compendium of gone-but-not-forgotten institutions, businesses, homes and amusements. The book contains memories of our neighborhood around the turn of the 20th century, when Luna Park on what is now the Arlington Alexandria border, near the water treatment plant, was the go-to amusement park for area residents. It featured roller coasters and circus performances, and in one famous incident a pack of elephants broke loose and terrorized local residents for more than a week (just like our zebras). Opening in 1906, Luna Park was described as " "forty acres of tackiness with space for 3000 picnickers, restaurants, a circus area and ballroom, as well as a 350 foot tall chute that spilled riders into a 80' deep lagoon." It flourished for a time, but after World War II much of it was destroyed in 1925.
